


Ellon : President — rotation of monthly Presidents







Who remembers



One of the pleasures of Inner Wheel is meeting up with friends old and new. Last week I had the pleasure of meeting up with Susan Coull of the Montrose club and her husband Jim. We reminisced about old times, me teaching at Montrose Academy and their involvement in so many charities and local projects over the years. One shared memory was of the Scarecrow Festival they started in Hillside and which my pupils at the time had great fun with, creating straw sculptures of Braveheart, The Mermaid of Montrose and Bamse—Montrose's war time hero dog. Happy days ! However, this was not the purpose of my visit. I wanted their recollections of Nyumbani—the huge project which both Rotary and Inner Wheel were involved in from 2005.

Susan recalls that she first heard about Nyumbani (which means "home" in Swahili)

from Rotarian friend Alison Stedman who had visited Kenya with a Rotary working party. In 2005 the Montrose club decided to support the orphanage in Nairobi which was home to around 100 children orphaned by AIDS and who are themselves HIV positive. The orphanage had been started in 1993 by a Jesuit priest and doctor, Father D'Agostino who had 3 children abandoned outside his door. At that time the AIDS/HIV epidemic was a national emergency in Kenya with a reported 1000 deaths daily. People were dying and families were being decimated. At first the aim was to give end of life palliative care—however with the advances in a vaccines and an influx of funds, the children survived and flourished. Today, as well as the orphanage in Nairobi which stretches over 2 acres, they have set up an extensive outreach programme operating from 6 clinics in slum areas of Nairobi; a state of the art clinic & diagnostic lab has been built in the grounds of the orphanage; and a village has been built in Kitui, a three hour drive from Nairobi - the first sustainable and planned response to the HIV/AIDS catastrophe. It occupies over 1,000 acres and caters for up to 1,000 children and 100 "grandparents" displaced by the Kenya AIDS epidemic. Living in small cottage units, the village provides a home for the most vulnerable, allowing them to heal, grow, be educated and self-reliant. It is an Eco village and includes organic farming, waterless toilet systems, irrigation from wells and sand dams and solar power. **Together these facilities now serve 4000 children every year.** An amazing achievement from very small beginnings.

In 2006 the Montrose Inner Wheel donated money to fund essential medical equipment and furnishing for the Leo Toto clinics. This was hand carried out to Nairobi by Susan and Alison and spent locally on supplies. This was part of a huge



local programme of fundraising so successful that £24,000 was taken out on that first trip!!!! News of the project spread throughout our District. In March 2006 Susan spoke to Jessie Stuart, then District Overseas Organiser to see if she could speak to the club overseas officers at the next Assembly, and this was agreed. *Cont.*

Having done this, she was delighted to hear that Jessie would back this project as her Overseas Project over the next 2 years. All sorts of events were organised, including a Ladies Dinner and Charity Auction in Montrose. Susan and Alison embarked on an extensive programme of speaking to clubs and getting the information to our members and the clubs response was amazing, eagerly raising funds for the project. The end result being that £8000 was raised, enough to fund the building of a house in Nyumbani Village. This was named The Wheelhouse. (Rotary funded 4 more). At our District Overseas Rally in

2007, held in the Dewars Centre in Perth, Prof. Charles Butler, a Reading Rotarian, gave а presentation on the



growth of the Nyumbani village and what had been achieved to date . In all Susan has been out on work parties to Nyumbani twice, as has Jim —but never together. From speaking with them it holds a very special place in their

hearts. They still sponsor a pupil and receive lovely letters and drawing from her. Jim recalls his trips as quite strenuous affairs building huts and cooking shelters for the "grandmothers"

who look after the children and partitioning off large rooms for use in the clinic. No easy task in the Kitui heat, living in huts with no electricity or



toiletries in the slums. All came home tired but happy to have been of service. District 1 also later raised enough money to sponsor the further education of 2 senior boys from the orphanage, Edwin and Bernard. Edwin is now married with 2 children and successfully employed. Bernard is working in Nyumbani garden while continuing his

The work continues. CORGI-Nyumbani (Scotland) Trust—a registered charity, was set up to further this work with Alison and Susan some of its first trustees. It is still in

existence today. Young people here in Scotland became involved with Nyumbani. Primary schools collecting books to send out to the village or fundraising for dictionaries. One school held a Nyumbani day, with pupils dressing up in African costume. Older children also became involved. In 2014 Alison took a team of teenagers from the Interact Club of

Inverkeithing assisted by teacher Frances Wilson from Montrose Academy. Frances has returned with pupils from Montrose Academy several times and the school is now twinned with Lawson High School in Nyumbani village. Each of the school's 4 houses sponsors a pupil, fundraising for their uniform, school books and the cost of their education. Huge collections have been made of football boots, scarves & strips, bras, text books, fish & chip jumpers and blankets. Pupils have gone on work parties to Kenya eagerly getting stuck in to painting, planting trees, harvesting sunflower seeds and pressing seeds to make oil, milking cows, doing repairs, digging ditches & outdoor fire pits, organising sports events etc.



All have come home enriched from the experience.

I have only been able to share a small portion of the ongoing work

and the story of Nyumbani. For those who were in Inner Wheel in the early days I hope you have enjoyed re-visiting and to newer members I hope it gives For more a glimpse into this exciting and ongoing overseas project. information, please refer to www.nyumbani.org


