We accept people for who they are, see the value in every individual, welcome them and do our very best for them. We are not here to judge actions or motives, rather to assist and support. We accept and respect every individual, regardless of race, gender, age, beliefs, (dis)ability or sexual orientation.

Then, on the 17th about 10-12 of us met for a fundraising coffee morning at Sue T's home and were also treated to a delicious selection of cakes and biscuits. In addition there was a book sale and raffle, and we all enjoyed catching up with each other's news.

Community Service

The Pilton School reading scheme continues, and of course we still bring donations for the Freedom Centre each month. Below is a recent list of requirements which our church was given when we donated to them at our Harvest Festival, so I think it should still be pretty much up to date:

<u>Freedom Centre</u> - This is a list of our current requirements to keep our kitchen running and provide food parcels for our clients:

Meals in a tin e.g. chilli, stew, curry, Tinned fruit e.g. pineapple chunks, pears, peaches, rhubarb, apple or mandarins, Tinned custard, Coffee, Biscuits, Granola bars, Chocolate bars, Orange juice – large or small cartons, Blackcurrant squash, UHT whole milk, White Flour – self raising and plain, Granulated white sugar, Jelly – any flavour, Gravy granules – beef, chicken and vegetable, Tomato puree, Brown sauce, Vegetable oil, Washing up liquid.

We have a huge amount of the following, so can we please ask you NOT TO SEND:

Baked beans, Tinned tomatoes, Tinned soup, Pasta and spaghetti, Tea.




There are not quite so many flowers now but there is still quite a bit of colour
