This is all without any charge to the NHS, The volunteers are all advanced motorcyclists, trained to the highest standards and using specially equipped motorcycles, operating in all weathers 365 days a year.

After the talk Sue presented Phil with a cheque for £100 which was made up of donations in lieu of presents for her recent birthday and quite a few members also gave donations. Following this we were all invited to inspect Phil's motorbike which was parked outside, and the picture shows one of our new members trying it out!
