Where has the month gone, I have been looking back over my diary for November as I wasn't sure I had done much to report. I know I have mentioned before that I record with a team of readers for Talking Newspaper, I thought I would say a bit more about what we do. There are 4 teams and each team takes it in turns to record an edition of the newspaper each week. It is getting more difficult to find articles in the local newspapers so we bulk it out with some magazine type items e.g. Theatre productions that have audio description, health issues, perhaps a poem or short story and we always try and finish with something to make people smile. Hello everyone,

Another month whizzed by in a blink. We are still in Whangarei and enjoying the peace and quiet.

Sadly I missed Aria's ballet concert. Rachel sent a photo and video of one of the dances. So cute - but I have no idea which one was Aria. Too far away and all dressed the same haha!!!

Nothing is quick to happen anymore. A crack appeared in my windscreen over 2 weeks ago and it takes 2 days for a replacement to come from Auckland then 2 weeks before it can be fitted!!!

Our washing machine stopped working when it had a full load. David managed to get it through the cycle, but it took 3 hours. He ordered a new machine. Of course the Black Friday sales had ended - then he had a call about when it was available and delivery dates - in January!!! So, he cancelled that and rang everywhere trying to find a place that we could buy a machine and get it the next day.

Yesterday 1st December - we picked up the new machine. I've plumbed machines in, in the past and it was simple. This one took over 3 hours!!!

... At last, we read the Beginning instructions. We followed them but it wouldn't do what it was supposed to, and every few minutes stopped and beeped. David went through everything and eventually realised the tap hadn't been turned on!!! I thought he'd done it, he thought I had! Yay - it now works and a successful load was washed. I was dreading going to a laundrette. It's years since I used one. Lots of funny/odd experiences using them.

You can't really tell too much, here in Whangarei, that Christmas is almost here. There are a few simple Christmasy things in shops but nothing like in UK. I expect in Auckland it will be a lot more like UK.

We are returning to Napier for Christmas. Hopefully we will be at our daughters for Christmas Day. We are not banking on anything though, after the last few years, when things didn't pan out how expected for one reason or another!!! The main thing is to enjoy being with Aria and watch her enjoy her presents.

There was a Martin Clune programme the other day that I happened upon, and he was in Alaska and visited a unique island, Kodiak Island, off the coast of Alaska. It was so interesting to learn about the bears there. They are a subspecies of the Brown bear, as are Polar bears.

Kodiak bears are the largest bears in the world. A large male can stand over 10' tall when on his hind legs, and 5' when on all four legs.

Though Kodiak bears are often touted as the <u>world's largest land carnivore</u> (meat eaters), they are really <u>omnivores</u> (using a variety of foods). They actually spend more time eating grass, plants and berries than meat. Fish are an important part of their diets, but few Kodiak bears expend the time or effort necessary to chase and kill mammals.

Kodiak bears are a unique subspecies of the brown or grizzly bear (*Ursus arctos middendorffi*). They live exclusively on the islands in the Kodiak Archipelago and have been isolated from other bears for about 12,000 years.

Cubs are born in the den during January or February. Weighing less than a pound at birth with little hair and closed eyes, they suckle for several months, emerging from the den in May or June. Most cubs stay with their mothers for 3 years.

Kodiak bears begin entering their dens in late October. Pregnant sows are the first to go to dens, males are the last. Males begin emerging from their dens in early April, while sows with new cubs may stay in dens until late June. Some males may forego denning, staying awake all winter.

I hope Researchers find answers to this...

Researchers from NASA and the medical professions are very interested in denning physiology. They are trying to figure out how bears can sleep for up to 8 months without eating, drinking, urinating or defecating, yet when they wake, they have lost little bone mass or muscle tone and have no signs of uremia. Understanding this could help astronauts during extended space flights or patients who are bedridden.

As early as the 1930s, biologists and ranchers were exploring ways to reduce the number of cattle killed by bears. At one point, bears were shot from airplanes, and a 9-foot high bear fence was proposed to bisect Kodiak Island and create a "bear-free zone." All active efforts at bear control in Kodiak ended in the mid-1960s.

Concern over reduced bear populations prompted sportsmen to petition the Federal government to protect bears and their habitat on Kodiak. The results of their efforts were stricter regulations and creation of **Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge in 1941**.

Today hunters kill about 180 Kodiak bears each year under tightly controlled regulations. About 5,000 resident hunters apply each year for a chance at purchasing one of the set amount of bear permits that are available. Hunters who are not residents of Alaska must hire a professional guide to be with them at all times.

Mature Driver Review

There is no legal age to stop driving and the partnership wants to support older drivers to make informed decisions and continue to drive safely.

Partners work in collaboration with IAM RoadSmart to provide free Mature Driver Reviews, worth £69, for mature drivers aged 65+ and residing in Warwickshire. The aim of the review is to give the driver advice and reassurance over their driving ability; it is not a test. The reviews have been carefully designed to help drivers renew their confidence, receive an informed and trusted opinion on their driving, improve skills and reassure family members. During the 60-minute, informal session, a qualified IAM expert will accompany the driver in their own vehicle, on roads that they are familiar with, offering advice and support.

The Mature Driver Review and, if recommended, further support and training will help drivers continue to drive for as long as it is safe to do so or support them with alternative choices if required.
