We can't just change things – all of us have to be a part of that decision to ensure success. Change cannot be imposed because the President wants it, or the Secretary wants fewer emails from Association.

Real discussion is needed. It is vital that clubs discuss our future earnestly and that all members take part so that all views are listened to.

Quite a task confronts us all.

I sincerely hope you all want to be part of that discussion. Most voluntary organisations are facing the same problems.

As we approach 100 years it would be gratifying to think that Inner Wheel is thriving. We have a lot of work to do if we wish to see that.

We can achieve it together.

It was good to see so many members and friends at the International Rally on Thursday 12 October. All the stalls were set up and busy selling long before the tea/coffee/cookies were served at 10.00 am. The Club stalls were provided by Stone, Brewood & District, Penkridge, Stafford, Shrewsbury and Wednesfield. Janet Smith ran a jewellery stall and Pauline Grainger the Inner Wheel Sales table.

In the car park donations for NPAC, ChildAid to Eastern Europe and shoe boxes for Teams 4U were loaded onto vans by members of Newport Rotary Club aided by Stan Jukes and Barry Picken. Once again, we are very grateful to the Rotary members for their help and assistance.

The members of the host club, Stafford Castle, did an excellent job carrying out their duties ensuring all donations were deposited correctly, assisting charity representatives as necessary and making sure fire exits were kept clear and the areas around the stalls were free from hazards.

District Chairman, Wendy Barnard, opened the Rally and lit the Candle of Friendship. She welcomed Rotary 1210 District Governor Dr Mukunda Chidrawar, and Steve Evans, Rotary International Officer, together with the speakers, members, and guests. PDC Sally Herbert gave the Health & Safety briefing.

Our first speaker was Kate Mawer from Practical Action a charity being represented at our International Rally for the first time. Kate, a retired geography teacher is a volunteer for Practical Action whose vision is to build a world that works better for everyone.

Kate discussed the work of Practical Action under four headings. First, she talked about The Enabler where Practical Action believes people living in poverty have the ability to change their world. They just need the right plans, tools, and knowhow to work in effective partnerships to empower change in their lives and overcome injustice, especially for women and vulnerable groups.

Secondly, Kate talked about Farming. Seventy-five percent of the world's poorest people rely on farming to make a living, many of whom are women. In order to make agriculture work better for struggling smallholder farmers and ensure they can adapt to climate change and achieve a good standard of living, Practical Action promotes the use of agroecology – an approach to farming that values people and planet and offers a sustainable alternative to intensive agriculture.

Energy transforms people's lives and Practical Action's ambition is to help more people harness the transformational power of clean affordable energy and reduce avoidable deaths caused by smoke from indoor fires and stoves. They are innovating in clean cooking and energy solutions including solar and water powered electricity.

Kate talked about Practical Action's work within cities. By 2030 there are expected to be two billion people living in slum cities and they are working with slum communities and utility companies to deliver sustainable sanitation, water and waste management services and protect the safety and dignity of waste workers.

Practical Action issues Briefing Sheets in many languages and they are all available online.

Our second speaker was David Gordon from the Book Bus charity, the nominated charity of Pam Boyes, Association International Service Committee Chairman. David reminded us that the charity began work with schools in Zambia and has now opened further reading schemes in Malawi and Ecuador. He talked about outreach work, providing safe and secure reading environments, i.e., schools and libraries and working within communities to provide the best use of the books. He said regular monitoring and evaluation has shown that primary children's literacy has risen from 11% to 33%. Monica, David's assistant, talked about two people from Malawi who the Book Bus had supported, that had gone on to university, one to study Economics and then to work for the World Bank.

David thanked Inner Wheel for its support in donating many thousands of books and funds towards the cost of purchasing and equipping a new bus. The target is £40,000 and with another year to run over half of the money has already been raised and David is very hopeful the target will be met.

Stephen Barbor from ChildAid to Eastern Europe was our third speaker of the morning. He told us that the charity was working in Belarus, Moldova, and Ukraine. He spoke about the Isle of Hope in Belarus a Day Care programme that is vital for disabled children as without it those children would be sent to jail. In Ukraine ChildAid is giving support in many areas where people are unable to flee because they may be vulnerable, disabled or orphaned. He also mentioned the Tony Hawks Centre in Moldova where ChildAid assists in the care of children who are disabled or who have been traumatised by the war in Ukraine.

Before we broke for lunch Dr Mukunda Chidrawar, Rotary 1210 District Governor addressed the meeting. He was unable to stay for the afternoon session so in bringing the greetings from Rotary he said how impressed he was with the work Inner Wheel does with international charities and hoped the Rally would be successful.

Following lunch Simon Cooke and Joshua Murindwa from Teams4u gave us an update on their work. Simon told us that the shoe boxes this year are going to deprived children/vulnerable adults/families in Ukraine, Romania, Bosnia, Moldova, and Georgia – many will be from Mariupol. He played a video which showed just how excited the children get when they receive a shoe box. Simon mentioned that a shoe box delivered to a young girl in war torn Sarajevo thirty years ago can now be seen in the Sarajevo War Childhood Museum. Apparently, the young girl was so thrilled to receive the box she never used the contents and kept the box under her bed for all those years.

Joshua spoke about his work in Uganda in sexual health education. Teams4u are working with the Welsh Government to develop a dignity programme to support schoolgirls in Uganda and Sierra Leone with washable sanitary pads and basic menstrual health education.

Our final speaker for the day was Claudia Domin from InterCare. Claudia told us that recycling is a very big part of their work – mobile phones, stamps, coins, ink cartridges etc. – for example one bag of mobile phones will raise about £130 which will purchase 5 wheelchairs for Sierra Leone. InterCare also distribute used medical devices, dentist chairs and items from GP practices that would otherwise go into landfill, to Africa. The InterCare Christmas campaign this year will take place between 4th to 13th December. Claudia said any donations made to the Charity during those dates would be match funded.

Following the presentations Wendy was invited to announce the numbers of the winning raffle tickets and then Jenny presented her with flowers.




REPORT FROM INTERNATIONAL RALLY - JENNY PICKEN

Our President's chosen charity for 2022/23 was Blood Bikes. We were delighted to present Helen Bunday, Coordinator for Blood Bikes, with a cheque for £1000 at our Club meeting in May. This amount was as a result of the various fund-raising events, we have held in the last 12 months.

It was decided that charitable donations should be made locally this year and so far, two charities have been approved: the Alzheimer's Society, Stafford, and Rockspur, a user lead charity for people with learning disabilities in South Staffordshire and Cannock.

Three major fundraising events have been scheduled for 2023/24. The first was our inaugural "Open Gardens" event on Sunday 23rd July. 10 local garden owners kindly opened their gardens to the public who paid for a programme to the event. This was an over-whelming success. The sun shone for most of the day, and we collected over £1,400 for distribution via our charity fund.

The generosity of the garden owners was immense, both in the preparation of gardens prior to the day and on the day itself, not to mention the worry regarding the weather! We had lovely comments throughout the day on the gardens, the owners and, of course, the refreshments.

Our thanks go to all the ladies who provided cakes for sale, to those who worked tirelessly all-day serving refreshments and working across the venues and to the members who visited the gardens and brought friends along.



Visitors enjoyed looking around the gardens and enjoyed the tea and cakes on offer.

Meetings in the last six months have included a fish and chip supper, our AGM and an address by the District Chairman, Wendy Barnard (who is also our President this year), about the District's activities and challenges for the forthcoming year. We have also been treated to "Tales from a Travel Agent" by Sally O'Hara and were honoured to have Nick Morris, the registered manager of Rockspur as our speaker. It was fascinating to hear about the work Rockspur undertakes on behalf of adults with special needs in South Staffordshire, and we were pleased to present Nick with a £1000 donation from the proceeds of our Open Gardens event in July.

Collections of donated items have been ongoing, and an impressive collection was delivered to the Solace Community who provide specialist supported housing for individuals who have experienced homelessness.

We donated numerous collections that have been taking place throughout the year to the relevant charity at the District's International Rally. This year, thanks to members' generosity and "good housekeeping" in keeping suitable items rather than discarding them into landfill, we were able to donate to Child Aid, National Police Aid Charity (NPAC), Intercare, and to the Craft Stall. In addition to the various collections donated, we organised and ran the Produce Stall. Our thanks go to all members who made and donated items for sale and to those who came on the day to help to run the stall as well as to those who attended the workshop to assist in preparation of the items for sale. This was truly a team effort. We should all be justly proud that our hard work both before and during the event raised a sum of £389.50 towards the total amount of money raised on the day.

A team of knitters excelled themselves by supplying knitted squares and one of our members, Barbara Mead, then spent a lot of time stitching the squares into blankets. The blankets are around 1 metre square and are big enough for mothers to tie their babies/toddlers onto their backs.

We were presented with some knitted blankets and baby clothes that were very kindly made for us by a member's neighbour. These were all passed on to Child Aid. They are beautiful garments and blankets, and we are in awe of the talent and generosity shown by making and donating these beautiful items.

In September 2020 during Lockdown, John Wilson, an Ambassador from the Buddy Bags Foundation, gave our Club a presentation on Zoom. We donated sufficient funds to buy four Buddy Bags for children in emergency care. A Buddy Bag is something a child can call their own, no matter where they go. They include toiletries, pyjamas, socks and underwear, in addition to comfort items such as a book and a teddy bear.



Everything in each bag must be the same and so when we offered to knit some teddies, we had to choose a specific pattern and wool from information on their website. It turned out that our member Joyce Pegg was the only experienced 'knitter' and she knitted a quantity of teddies with special 'teddy' wool that she bought with money that some of us donated to her. The teddies were stored in her office and when she thought that she had made enough, she intended to give them to the Foundation. Sadly, Joyce died before that day came and John, her husband, brought them to us when he found them, not knowing the story behind them. The teddies were carefully packed up and sent to Buddy Bags in Sutton Coldfield, with a covering letter explaining how they came to be with us. We received a very touching response back from them.



In the summer President Kath arranged an afternoon tea at Love Coffee at Salop Leisure. We had a lovely afternoon and were welcomed by Tony Bywaters the Chairman who showed great interest in our charity events.

In September President Kath welcomed our new member Ingrid at our first lunch meeting after our break.

At our October meeting we presented the final cheque to Hope House and a cheque to John, a pilot for The Air Ambulance after a very interesting talk and slide show. What brave people they are.

We presented Secretary Marion with a gold rose and card for her golden wedding anniversary.

In November we are celebrating our 80th Birthday and will be welcoming District Chairman Wendy Barnard as our speaker.

Ironbridge Inner Wheel have been donating toiletries and women's hygiene products to Families in Telford, for young mothers, and they are very grateful for our donations. They are operating at Sutton Hill, and Dawley Christian Centre, as well as the Park Lane Centre, Woodside. At Christmas they are planning to give a wrapped book to each child, so while we are all out and about, we will be looking for books for 'little ones', and will add some toiletries for the mothers, something more in the pampering line than we usually give, for a Christmas gift bag for them.

The International Rally was a great success, with excellent speakers. Ironbridge Inner Wheel donated a large amount of goods for Child Aid and the NPAC, which were gratefully received. The speakers were very good as usual, but we were particularly impressed by the speaker from Practical Action, a new charity for us.

In September Ironbridge Inner Wheel held a Pudding Evening at the home of President Sheena. The District Chairman was in attendance, and everyone thoroughly enjoyed the evening of gorgeous puddings and a raffle. We raised £281. This was a welcome boost for our Charity account and followed the success of a concert earlier in the summer, which was entirely 'in house' - we have very talented musicians and singers in Ironbridge Inner Wheel.

Some other charities we have decided to support in kind, are Forget-Me-Not, and Kip. Forget-Me -Not is a local dementia charity, and we have decided (at their suggestion) to buy memory books for the clients, to jog their memories of past events and traditions. As usual Kip, the Telford Homelessness Charity, will be the recipient of our Reverse Advent Calendars in January for Inner Wheel Day. Reverse Advent Calendars are an excellent idea for homeless charities and food banks, consisting of 25 non-perishable food stuffs from each of our members.

Ironbridge Inner Wheel continues to meet monthly at The Water Rat, Ironbridge. We have recently welcomed two new members from the closed The Wrekin Inner Wheel Club, Anne, and Shirley. In November we are going to make Christmas crackers under the tutelage of Treasurer Liz, followed by our Christmas meeting on 13th December. Former members will be invited too, we are always delighted to see them. In January we meet on Inner Wheel Day, so can we bring our Reverse Advent Calendar foodstuffs to that meeting. At the January Meeting Christine will speak about and demonstrate musical instruments.

At the final Club meeting of 2022-2023 held in June, outgoing Club President Nicole presented a cheque for £800 to Katie Foster for Nicole's chosen charity Alzheimers Research UK. This was followed by the handover to incoming President Jane Chadwick.



The much-anticipated Club outing/luncheon at the Tile Press Café, Maws Craft Centre, Jackfield took place at the end of June. Delicious food, with good friends and an interesting location – result - a super day out.

Our first meeting of the new Inner Wheel year was notable for the induction of a new member, Dawn Maley – welcome Dawn.



In September a joint service with Newport Rotary Club held at All Saints Church, Forton, gave us focus for the year ahead. We had a very interesting talk by a lady from HSBC on scams, at our September Club meeting.

It was my pleasure to speak at our October Club meeting about my involvement in Inner Wheel and about the Harry Johnson Trust. A donation of £100 has been sent to the Trust.
