

We have warmly welcomed a new member to our local Club. Mary Simms was inducted into the Membership of the Inner Wheel by our President, Dr Mary Morris, in our May Meeting.

June was sadly our last evening meeting at Diellas Restaurant in Seaford. Stefano was presented with a Marks and Spencer Voucher by President Dr Mary Morris as a token of our appreciation for all his kindness and attention whilst we have







been there. From July we will be gathering on the 2nd Tuesday of each month at Seaford Golf Club, Firle Road, commencing at mid-day.

Members of the Inner Wheel Club went for their fortnightly stroll along the Seafront ending up at the Sailing Club for coffee and chat. The weather has been kind so far, let's keep our fingers crossed for further dates.

On 18th September one of our members, Anne Vickers, held a coffee morning at her house. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves and especially the lovely cakes that she had made for us. All proceeds were donated to the Young Carers.

On the 19th September, nineteen members met at the Old Boot Inn for an evening meal. This occasion was arranged so that members who are unable to meet at our monthly lunchtime meeting at the Blatchington Golf Club on a Tuesday can get together with friends to catch up on news. We were very well accommodated with good food and service. The evening meal was organised by Maggie Posgate, a member of the Club's Social committee, and it is intended that in future, evening meetings will be held once every three months.

October has been a busy month for the ladies of the Inner Wheel socialising whilst fundraising. Past President, Andrea Butti hosted an Afternoon Tea at her house, on the 9th October, where members congregated to fill shoe boxes for the Charity "Link to Hope". The Charity aims to combat poverty and give humanitarian aid to the most disadvantaged. The poorest, especially people struggling to survive in rural villages that lack basic amenities, are the most vulnerable and most exploited. The shoe boxes are sent to families and the elderly in Eastern European countries and are filled with everyday essentials.

On the 19th October, members attended the Inner Wheel District International Rally at Ashington, West Sussex. The International President for the District, is Aileen Hargreaves, and her chosen charity is "Hope House Haiti". This well-attended rally exhibited plenty of different stalls supporting the organisation with a lovely lunch provided. Seaford ran a popular Tombola stall. A presentation was given by charity volunteers who explained how the charity was formed by Yvrose and Pierre Richard Telfort, a Haitian couple, who set up "Hope House" as a home to look after children orphaned after the devastating earthquake in 2010. They established a school, and later a Secondary School in 2014, providing free education, health checks and a daily hot meal for the poorest children in the local community. Aileen Hargreaves stated, "Hearing about disasters around the world has sadly become too frequent and we strive to provide help, in as many ways we can, to as many charities as possible but often feel frustrated that we are unable to do more. The consequences of the disasters are far reaching and impact greatly on family life, children's health, development, and security which is of great importance and the disruption can last for many years long after the disaster occurred". The Inner Wheel Club also strives to support Charities in this country, addressing the needs of local and national charities.

On the 25th October, our President, Maureen Edgar, hosted a Coffee Morning at her house which included a raffle. A substantial amount of money was raised for her charity "Chestnut Tree House". This children's charity provides hospice care services and community support for children and young people with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions in Sussex and Southeast Hampshire, as well as providing support to their parents and carers.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERVICE RALLY

ASHINGTON 19TH OCTOBER 2023

It was a showery day, so arrivals at the Ashington Village Hall were pleased to be served refreshments by Guildford Inner Wheel Club members. The event was very well attended by more than 66 Inner Wheel Ladies, and there were many stalls around the Hall, selling homemade cakes, Christmas goodies, books, bric-a-brac, etc, all doing a lively business as truly nice things were being sold. Then there was the Raffle with just a few very nice prizes: for example, a large basket of fruit, beautifully presented, and a delicious-smelling Stephanotis potted plant which I think was won by a Guildford member; a drift of the flower's perfume wafted past as the Lady returned to her seat nearby.

We were served a truly delicious lunch by Debbie and her Assistants: we had chicken, stuffing balls, pigs in blankets, ham and pineapple, hard-boiled eggs, coleslaw, couscous decorated with tomatoes and grapes, tomatoes with mozzarella, green salad, warm buttered new potatoes and rolls and butter. For dessert, those of us with the inclination had bought cakes from the delectable choice on Guildford's cake stall.

After a necessary 'comfort break', District 25th International Service Officer, Aileen Hargreaves of Cuckfield & Lindfield Club, introduced the speakers from District 25's International charity for this year, 'Hope House Haiti'. There were two Ladies who had been to Hope House and worked there, so they had many, many slides to show us of 'then and now' conditions at the farm house there that was adapted as a home and school for children orphaned by the 2010 Haitian earthquake. We were told how the school was developed with the emphasis not only on education but also on befitting the children for working life. In addition to giving a home and education to the children, they have developed the farmland to provide food for them all.





Sadly, in recent years lawlessness on Haiti has grown and the farm and its inhabitants were under threat, so they built a wall all around the Home and its environs. Nevertheless, it was necessary for them to venture out to Port au Prince for provisions and other activities and when this became too dangerous instead they got what they needed by going over the nearby border into the Dominican Republic. Sadly this is still an ongoing situation and one of the Ladies, a teacher, has been unable to return for several months. As you can imagine, such a detailed Report took more than an hour to relate.







At the end of their detailed talk Aileen presented the two Ladies with a cheque from District 25 Inner Wheel members.
