Club News

We met on March 5th for our annual club business meeting to decide our club officers and committee for the 2024-25 year. It was agreed Sue Thomas would be President for a second year, and Sue Smith will be Vice-President. Pam Harman is taking over the International Secretary role from Pat Bunch and we will be welcoming Maggie Sheriff and Jenny Woodley on to the committee. The position of Secretary is still to be resolved, but should be soon.

After lunch we had an excellent presentation by Mick Harrison, a retired policeman, from the South West Cyber Protection Unit about how to protect ourselves against online fraud. He told us that today, 89% of fraud is online, with much of it coming from abroad. When it comes to choosing passwords, it is now recommended they should be 12 characters long, often using a mix of small and capital letters, numbers and other symbols. Three unrelated words are good, and a particularly useful tip is to use the £ symbol which is not available on many overseas keyboards.

95% of successful attacks are caused by human error, remember that if it looks too good to be true it usually is, and never be pressurised into making quick decisions. Look <u>very</u> carefully at website addresses which can be very similar to official ones and <u>never</u> disclose passwords. Also, official symbols of bona fide organisations can be copied on to fake websites.

Be aware of payment diversion fraud, usually by claims that an account has been changed and <u>never</u> disclose pin numbers.

There was a lot more advice in this talk, but the overall message is to always be aware (and this of course also applies to phone calls) and to report suspected fraud and scams to Action Fraud (actionfraud.police.uk). Sue Thomas gave the vote of thanks.



Spring District Meeting and Skittles Competition

Easter Eggs
