After lunch we had a highly entertaining talk by retired teacher Gary Reed who used to be Headmaster at Swimbridge Primary School. He was inspired to be a teacher after reading the Miss Read Village School books as a child, and went on to say that

He then went on to describe a series of incidents such as mistaken identity on his part of several visitors, getting locked out of his room, etc, but also the difficult time when he had to tell the pupils that one of their class mates had died. He was quite clearly an inspiring teacher that I could have listened to for much longer, and at the end of his talk Pam H gave him our vote of thanks.



Two weeks after this four of us went to the Waie Inn with the intention of meeting informally with members of other District clubs, but unfortunately no one else turned up! However, it was a very nice day and we had a pleasant lunch with lots of chat. We did decide, however, that this particular event had run its course as there did not appear to be much enthusiasm for it, and we just might have been in Barnstaple!. (Sue White was there as well).

Future Club Events

There's a lot happening in October, starting with our next club meeting on Tuesday 1st October, and we're hoping to start meetings a bit earlier at 11.45 for 12.15 as there is a lot of business to cover, and we need to finish at 3pm.
