#### D12 - June Christophi

The Teddy Trust collects teddy bears from around the UK and sends them to children who are suffering the traumas of war, starvation, or abuse.

#### Can you knit a jumper for a Teddy Bear?

Size 4 needles and 100 g of DK wool

#### Back

Cast on 40 sts. Knit (garter stitch) every row until work measures 10cm (4inches). Increase for sleeves. Increase 5 stitches at the beginning of the next 6 rows (70st). Continue in Garter stitch until the sleeve edge measures 10cm (4inches) Cast off

#### Front

Cast on 40sts. Knit as for back to sleeves.

Increase for sleeves. Increase 5 stitches at the beginning of the next 6 rows (70sts). Continue in garter stitch until the sleeve edge measures 5cm (2inches). With the right-side facing Knit 35 sts. Turn, and Continue on these 35 sts. Knit in Garter stitch for a further 5cm (2inches) Cast off. Rejoin wool, starting with the wrong side, knit in garter stitch to match the first side for 5cm (2inches) Cast off.

#### To Make up

Sew side seams to sleeve opening.

Sew shoulder seams, so each seam measures 7.5cm (3 inches) from the sleeve edge. This leaves a neck opening of about 15cm (6inches) so that with the slit opening in the front of jumper will fit easily over the Teddy's head.

You may recall that I reported during lockdown of getting up early and walking up the hill to the top of Alexandra Palace to watch the sunrise coming up over London town. I became addicted until the clocks changed in the Spring and it suddenly dawned on me that I was leaving the house at 5.15 am in the morning to chase my sunrise surprise!

Moving forward, a friend of mine contacted me in Autumn last year to alert my attention to a project that was happening – it asked for people to send in photographs of themselves at Ally Pally. So, the next time I did my sunrise walk, I took a selfie at 6 am and sent it off.

At the beginning of June, I received an e-mail to confirm that I was now a piece of art!!!

To celebrate 150 years of Alexandra Palace, they teamed up with visual artist Helen Marshall to create "By The People: A 150 Lifetimes", an ambitious project to preserve thousands of people's memories and connection to London's iconic Alexandra Palace. If you copy the link below, you will see that the mural has been made up of about 2,000 peoples photographs which you can zoom into really closely!

A few days later, I was sat at my desk eating my sandwich lunch and thought I would have another look at the image, on my big desk computer screen, and voila, I found my photograph pretty much straight away!



I haven't had the opportunity to go and see the actual mural in the flesh but a friend of mine recently had a couple of days work at Ally Pally. She sent me a message to say "how rude!" They've put bolts through your face!!! Sure enough, there I was on the join of the mural segments with 2 bolts through my face At least people will not have a problem finding my photo!

#### A remarkable story of "Reach & Inspire"

One of my earliest memories is when I was 5 years old. I was at the hospital with my mother, having just had a hearing test. The consultant told her. "Don't bother wasting your time on her, she will never achieve anything." I can see the consultant as clearly as if it was yesterday, I didn't understand the implications of his words, but I knew he wasn't being very kind.



Fortunately for me, my mother took no heed and despite my refusal to wear the box hearing aid I was given, it brought me a level of negative attention I hated, I was educated in mainstream school. I passed the eleven plus, went to grammar school and then on to a London University, ultimately becoming a maths teacher.

In September 2016, I was challenged to take on The Bath Half Marathon and The London Marathon 2017. Nothing unusual about that, except at the time I was a 59 year old non-runner and more to the point, a registered blind guide dog owner.

I had been diagnosed at the age of 29 with a condition called Retinitis Pigmentosa. The consultant who delivered this news was no less brutal than the ENT consultant, telling me I would be registered blind within ten years and there was nothing they could do. At the time I was six months pregnant with my second child. I felt sorry for myself for about two days, when I decided I had a family to look after and from that point on I took one day at a time, living a full and active life. I was determined I would not disable myself with self pity, that was a burden I did not want to give my family. I also have rheumatoid arthritis and Lupus, diagnosed age 32, along with other auto immune diseases, but I don't let it stop me livina my life.

Failing sight meant I was losing my independence, being matched with my first Guide Dog in 2005 opened up a whole new world. That was when I vowed to raise as much money as I could for Guide Dogs.



I've always been a sucker for a challenge, and I had seven months to prepare for the marathon, with the help of a guide runner.

People often ask me why I decided to take these events on, there is no simple answer. A combination of raising funds for Guide Dogs and to see if I could do it. I didn't want to spend my life with regrets, wondering if I could have done it. It was not easy, I was literally running blind, as I didn't have a clue about running, much less long distance running!



After months of intensive training, I crossed the finish line of The Bath Half Marathon and six

weeks later The London Marathon. I also managed to surpass the £2000 compulsory target and raised nearly £7500. Then I was hooked, the



following year I repeated the two events, along with Yeovil Half Marathon, two 10k events and my first triathlon, prior to triathlon training I couldn't swim properly, and I had NEVER ridden a bike! £12500 was raised that year.

I'm still competing, the latest challenge was The Langport Triathlon in September 2024. In 2025 I will take on The Bath Half and London Marathons, I will be 67 when I take on these challenges. I will continue to do these challenges while I can, raising more funds for the charity close to my heart. To date I have raised in excess of £120000 and I hope that this year I will exceed what I raised in 2018.

**Post Marathon** 

Following the first marathon I was encouraged

to write my story, personal life as well as my marathon journey and I published my first book, 'Running Blind' last year. I'm currently working on the sequel, 'Blind Tri'. The book is available as a standard print, large print, audio and kindle.

#### Pru Witter - D20 Joint Chairman

In 2014 one of our now Joint Chairmen, namely Pru Witter, cycled from her home in Somerset to the Association Conference in Telford, a distance of some 140 miles. She was joined by a friend and the journey took 3 days. They both fell off and one had a puncture but they arrived safely in Telford having raised money for "WizzyBugs", D20's charity for the year, supporting "Wheels" to celebrate 90 years of Inner Wheel.



#### Patricia Clews - D7 Chairman

I was once given half a crown by a Chancellor of the Exchequer. "Anthony Barber was Chairman of Redferns National Glass where my dad was a foreman. My dad took me with him when he went to collect his wages and the man, he was talking to, gave me half a crown. I was 4 years old. He went on to become a life peer - Baron Barber of Wentbridge, West Yorkshire".

#### THE HISTORY OF THE POLICE WHISTLE - Ruth Haskins Solihull D6

The first police force in England gave their officers wooden rattles to draw attention when they needed help. In the 1880s', when it became clear that the rattles were not loud enough, they were replaced by the Acme Police Whistle.

The owner of the Acme company, Joseph Hudson, invented it after he heard the screeching sound made when he dropped a violin on the floor and smashed it. He said that the sound is really high pitched and loud and is not like anything else.



Joseph Hudson entered a competition, held by the Metropolitan police force, to design a better way of attracting attention. With his design he won a contract to supply this new loud whistle.

Acme was founded in 1870 and became the world's largest and most famous producer of whistles. One year after inventing his first police whistle, Joseph Hudson had taken orders for over 250,000 whistles and was employing 50 people. He later invented the first referee whistle for football matches, prior to this a handkerchief was used to draw attention at games! Hudson later invented the 'Acme Thunderer' the first ever pea whistle and remains the most used whistle in the world, from train guards to dog handlers.

The company was family run for over a hundred years, by three generations of the Hudson family. Since 2014 the company has been owned and managed by Simon Topman.

During recent programmes about the 80th Anniversary of the D-day landings it was mentioned that the Acme Company had made the metal 'clickers' used by the paratroopers during landings on French soil. One click was activated and if a paratrooper heard a response with two clicks he knew he was amongst friends and allies rather than enemies.

The firm is based in Birmingham. I have toured its workshops and can recommend a visit.

All club members agreed and Jennie was thrilled to present Anthea with the award at their club meeting on 11th July 2024.
