INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT Mamta Gupta, joined Inner Wheel 23 years ago and has made an incredible impact at every stage of her Inner Wheel journey, in a country so different from our own. As President of the IW Club of Calcutta, she acquired land to build a home for the elderly. In 2015-16, as DC Mamta was able to chronicle a history book about the existing 51 clubs and the first E- Newsletter was launched.

As India's Inner Wheel's Association President in 2019-20 she collaborated with other National and Government bodies to oversee the adoption of over 600 orphans and foster caring for over 24,000 children, showcasing just one of her initiatives for an unwavering commitment to social change. Additionally, 73 new clubs (23 New Gen) were formed, and 6840 new members were inducted.

Mamta's tenure as IIW Board Director in 2020-21 was focused on building relationships with clubs scattered globally. Last year, 2023-24, as IIW Vice-President, Mamta continued to blaze trails, overseeing the formation of new clubs and expanding Inner Wheel's global footprint. Her influence has crossed borders, as evidenced by her instrumental role in establishing a new club in Uganda – with 43 members, sponsored by her home club, Mamta has epitomized resilience, innovation, and amazing dedication to service.

This year as International President Mamta has already started her work in Uganda to vaccinate 1,000,000 girls against cervical cancer using the bedrock of the IW clubs to establish links with the communities. Like our Year 8 girls in England, who have automatically been offered the vaccination since 2008, they too will now be offered this protection!

One small summer episode, one IW member - Jane Lowe, Barnstaple

Have you ever been to the BBC Proms at London's Royal Albert Hall or watched any of the Proms on the television? Many may wonder, knowing my passion for variety in life, why I should keep traipsing back there year in year out. Over the last 56 years, each and every event has been memorable but one of this year's performances was especially so.

With my husband Jim and two friends, new to the Proms, we were part of a special performance on August 24th marking the 200th Anniversary of Beethoven's 9th Symphony, a "game of two halves" revolving around the profoundly deaf genius Beethoven.

The first half was a stage play taking Beethoven's 139 recently discovered 'chat diaries' that he used to communicate with others. This was acted out, revealing so much about his life, including his frustrations, his nervousness and his foods choices. (For example the lead-based sweetener in the cheap wine he constantly drank probably contributed to liver disease and his death at 56.) He was human, he was deaf and we got this insight. All this was explained throughout with the addition of sign language. During this time 'MC' Nicholas Collon also explained in easy-to-understand words the musical structure of each movement of the symphony with the Aurora Orchestra. Everybody on stage, actors and musicians stood to perform, gliding on and off stage as they were needed. Every part was done by memory. Collon brought on singers, such young people, again working from memory as it was explained how that famous "Ode to Joy" melody came into being. Collon was demanding - we, the audience, had to join in and slacking was not tolerated. Using the basic notation words of Do Ray Me etc to sing the tune, the many thousands of us in that Hall (including me) were totally confused after 5 minutes about which note was which! But what fun.

The second half was a performance of the 9th Symphony with a difference. No scores, no stands, every part was done by memory. The work never fails in its "wow factor". As an audience, somehow we felt we had invested in this - after all we had worked too. As it was at its premier in 1824, it was greeted with standing rapturous applause. And, the icing on the cake for me was watching the TV replay - at the very end, when the credits finished, as the camera panned round, I saw myself for 3 seconds in the Choir East seats on national TV!

He wanted to celebrate the games by depicting one of the most challenging events. Willard's work is a test of his endurance and commitment to finish, much like the dedication of heptathletes who compete in what is widely considered to be the ultimate athletic test over two days.

Materials: 24-carat gold javelin, Kevlar, nylon and painted with an eyelash.

Time to make: 10 weeks

We entered a room full of microscopes and were mind blown by what we saw. To add to this it was actually the day Katerina Johnson-Thompson was competing in the Olympics in Paris. If you don't know about Willard Wigan Google him and find out about his life and what he has achieved - it is a very powerful and thought provoking story.

INNER WHEEL EUROPEAN RALLY DENMARK 2025

Join the 3rd European Rally in Denmark from September 25th to 28th 2025.

The next European Rally will take place in Aarhus – the 2nd largest city of Denmark.

Aarhus is a village metropole and appointed 'one of the best places to visit' by Time Magazine.
