

District 22 members, their families and friends came together to celebrate the season of Christmas and all that it means at St Peter and St Paul's Church, Church Warsop.



Members also helped the Rotary Santa when he appeared at the local Asda store and with Sutton Academy's Festive Dinner held on 21st December.







There were 98 ladies sitting down from 20 clubs in District 22. Lunch was, as always at The Hostess, excellent with good, wholesome food which leaves many a clean plate.

Fatou Bahbah is CEO of the Ebou Mala's Children Charitable Foundation founded in 2017 and which now covers all of Gambia, where Fatou was born. She works as a Charge Nurse at Birmingham Hospital and wishes to offer equal opportunities, healthcare and help with challenges faced by children and families back in Gambia.

Fatou works with partners in France and England, especially NPAC, and arranges for old ambulances, hospital beds, desks for classrooms and items for skills training, e.g. old sewing machines. They have now added in the sanitary pads, football kits for both boys and girls and our baby bundles are very well received. There are challenges - finance to deliver the goods is one. Fatou has now made it possible to "sponsor" health bills / equipment as there is not

always the equipment in clinics or the medicine available; education by renovating a classroom but most of all she needs volunteers to help her with fundraising, media, etc. It was noted that the partners in France usually give financial help. 1029 black pants had been donated by District 22 that day and £105.64 was collected for Mary's Meals.

Joan Green, East Area International Committee member, thanked Fatou for her talk. This charity is quite personal for Joan, as she has been to the Gambia and she also works with NPAC. She said that it now costs NPAC about £ 2,500 per container and then the same again on landing.

Lynda thanked everyone who had helped make the rally a success, naming some individuals especially her husband who kindly loaded the car with bras and knickers as well as 64 shoe boxes. She presented Fatou with a gift and a bouquet of flowers to thank her for her interesting, enlightening talk and announced that the raffle had made £457 for the Ebou Mala charity.

Lynda thanked those ladies who attended for making the luncheon a success, a big thank you, as always, to The Hostess staff for looking after us all and she handed the meeting over to District Chairman, Lyn, who reiterated thanks and wished everyone a safe journey home.

President Jean was accompanied by Association Treasurer Gloria in laying a poppy wreath from the club in honour of the men and women who served our country.





I can say for all the members of Mapperley & District Inner Wheel, we are looking forward to the new year building on the firm foundations Elaine has started.




