INNER WHEEL CLUB OF BARNSTAPLE NEWSLETTER APRIL 2025

Hello once again! What extraordinary events are taking place in the world at the moment, and after the wonderful spell of sunny days the weather is now unsettled as well! However, whatever else is happening, the Inner Wheel as always keeps to its principles of Friendship, Fellowship and Service, and long may this be the case.

Club News

We met at the Park Hotel on 1st April for our club meeting this month, and we will also be at this venue in May and June whilst the Barnstaple Hotel is refurbished. The dining area feels much more cramped and is darker compared with our usual facilities, but the food and service were fine. Sorry no pictures of this meeting – I think the different situation meant I didn't think about it!

President Sue had already told us the sad news that member Carole Roberts died on March 23rd, and she started the meeting with some words of condolence. Her funeral is on April 22nd at St. John the Baptist, Instow at 1.30pm. I have to warn you that access is tricky – it's up a hill from the main road and whilst there will be parking in an adjacent farmyard I'm not sure that will be enough for everybody.

On a much happier note Sue then inducted three new members, Beckie Fowler, Gill Mulligan and Sandy Peace – welcome to all of them and I wish them many happy years with the club.

Then, after the routine business of the club, and a nice lunch our own member Jane Carpenter told the very interesting and moving story of her father, Carl, from the 1930s onwards. Her grandparents were part of a large Jewish community in Vienna, and Carl was born in 1933. The Nazis became a threat in 1934 and Germany annexed Austria in 1938. Carl escaped initially to Belgium, and then came to England on one of the

Kindertransports in May 1939 where he was taken in by a Jewish family in Stamford Hill. Emergency legislation in November 1938 permitted unaccompanied children to come to Britain without the usual permits, with the first transport taking place the following month. These transports continued for the next 9 months until the outbreak of war, bringing 10,000 children in total. Following the war Carl found that his father had died in a concentration camp but his mother had survived. Jane ended by saying that Carl was married to her mother for 58 years, dying in 2017, and that in 2019 Austria offered citizenship to the children and grand children of displaced Austrians.



When we think back to World War II it is extraordinary to hear about the experiences of so many of our parents during this time, this one in particular, and it is so important we don't forget about that time.



IW National Conference

Our club meeting took place whilst the Association Conference was in progress at Harrogate from March 31st to April 2nd and as I didn't go this year, I am very grateful to June for the following account and pictures:

The sun shone and the flower displays around Harrogate were beautiful. The venue was special and the programme an excellent mix!

Heather Sheerin, our Association President with her Council and Conference Committee really pulled out all the stops. The AGM was informative, there were lots of stalls and all the speakers were inspiring. The variety of entertainment, with a world class brass band, a school choir and the two 'girls' leading 400+ 'older girls' mingling and dancing in an evening of 60s, 70s and 80s music was not to be missed!



Keynote speakers Angela Rippon and Gill Castle stood out for me. While Angela's journalist and broadcasting story is more widely known, Gill shared her incredible journey of overcoming PTSD and childbirth injuries that led to stoma surgery in 2011. Despite being medically retired as a front-line police officer and having a significant fear of open water, she became a record-breaking channel swimmer, raising £50,000 for her charity supporting women adapting to stoma surgery or

childbirth injuries in the UK and Kenya. So much to think about!

Next year, March 2026, the Conference is in Llandudno - Our clubs are the heart of Inner Wheel but these three days are special, fun and well worth a glimpse of the bigger Inner Wheel picture. Best wishes, June T.

'I want to say a very big thank you and update you on our money 'recycling' for Mary's Meals. As you know we collected 30kg for exchange nearly a month ago. £650.51 has gone directly to Mary's Meals. (As you can see below it is a very detailed list!) I was also given US Dollars and Swiss Francs and was asked to exchange that money separately by members as I didn't know exactly how the listing would work. I did the second exchange separately.

I did the second exchange separately and it has raised another £263. 26. <u>This adds up to £913.77 - a great recycling</u> <u>result for such a worthy cause!</u> We haven't finished collecting and hope to round that up by the end of our Inner Wheel Year at the end of June. Hopefully, Joanna Blake, our SW Coordinator for Mary's Meals will be able to come and speak to us too and accept a final cheque.

Easter

We have just celebrated Easter on 20th April which is one of the later dates, as it can be anything from March 22nd to April 25th. Why does the date vary? The calculation of the Easter date or 'Computus Paschalis' is enormously complicated with a history dating to Roman times, but stated simply it is the first Sunday after the the Paschal Full Moon (an approximation of the astronomical full moon) which is the one that falls on or after 21st March (an approximation of the Sprng Equinox). The date was originally set to coincide with the Jewish Passover, but changes in the calendar, particularly going from the Julian to the Gregorian means that the link is not so strong. The reason that our Easter is on a different date to the Eastern Orthodox churches is that they still go by the Julian calendar. Easter was last on March 22nd in 1818 and will next be on this date in 2285. It was last on 25th April in 1943 and will next be in 2038 so a greater chance for some of us to see that date!
