A very informative talk was given by Janice Holmes, founder of Janice Rose Lingerie. After working for M&S for 35 years as a bra fitter and trainer of staff in fitting, Janice was made redundant and set up her business in 2019 as a bra fitter. She was particularly concerned as a breast cancer patient herself, about the lack of information for women about what to wear post surgery. She was also keen to help charity and linked up with New Life Children's Centre in Newark, near her business. She discovered that women in Africa without underwear are liable to assault, so she wanted to take bras to Gambia. She went on the radio and was featured in the local press and within 2-3 months had 10,000 bras. Several ladies offered to go with her and her teenage children also went to distribute the bras in Gambia and a 40ft container went out ahead of them. She showed a moving video of the distribution in schools, to staff, and communities in Gambia which happened over a week. She gave talks about breast development in school. She has returned since with 1000 bras and 10,000 pants in a suitcase. Now every year 2-3 trips go out to Gambia.

Now she is a bra bank for recycling new or nearly new bras, but has also been trained in prosthesis fitting for ladies after surgery and can go into hospital to do this. She has the advantage of also being a bra fitter. She is currently advocating for a voucher scheme so ladies can have a choice of prosthesis. The choice offered in hospital can be limited. She has been on the local East Midlands News about her petition which an MP is taking to Parliament. She passed round some prostheses so we could feel the weight of a breast.

She has also produced Tik Tok videos on how to put on a bra and how to wash it, not in a washing machine. She is very concerned that many women damage their breasts by ill-fitting bras. Her business has expanded to six employees. She has been trained for each brand of bra she fits. There can be up to 87 sizes in one style of bra. Breasts can change from puberty, during pregnancy and at the menopause. All these phases of life need a good supportive bra which can transform the shape and stop potential breast pain. She then went on to talk about being aware of breast changes and checking our breasts. The bras collected by District will go to Smalls for All as Janice will not be sending out a container until later in the year. A fascinating talk
