Fifty years in any organisation is an incredible achievement, so I decided to ask Mai about her memories and thoughts on her time as a member of Inner Wheel Carmarthen. Dudley, said that he had been invited to become a member of Rotary as he was of 'Good Character' ('ha-ha'... said Mai), and as a wife of a Rotarian she was invited to join Inner Wheel. Membership then was by invitation. She felt, as if 'she had arrived'. She said she was the youngest member, in her twenties, the baby of the club, and was looked after and supported by the other members, especially her next-door neighbour Nest Crane.



Her memories are of a group of ladies, many formidable characters, but wonderful company, committed members and hard workers, who would take her to events and meetings near and far, with many adventures on the way.

Meetings were fun but formal, especially at District level, where you were still expected to wear a hat and gloves. White tablecloths were De Rigueur, and the club even had its own crockery, white cups, saucers and plates emblazoned with the Carmarthen Inner Wheel emblem.

Mai said that historically, there seemed to be more voluntary organisations, with lots of socialising and greater cooperation between them. Carnivals, Ox Roasts, Fetes in the park and Agricultural shows, such as the Three Counties Show were held annually. Inner Wheel would have stalls and a presence at these events allowing them to seen by and engage the public. Knit and Natter, Cheese and Wine parties, Coffee Mornings and Celebration Teas were held regularly. Members also delivered Meals on Wheels, alternating with Rotary and other organisations to do so. It was hard work but rewarding.

Informative and interesting guest speakers from local and national organisations and charities over the past fifty years gave her an insight into how Carmarthen and the world was changing and how we must adapt, but at the same time learn from the past.

Mai has been President twice, 1988-9 and 2013-14 and has held all the other offices, some more than once. She is still a stalwart and supportive member of Inner Wheel and its members and one of the first to volunteer, especially with the washing up!

Thank you for your friendship and commitment Mai, now, and for many years to come.


