This was held on 4th November at the Barnstaple Hotel, and donations were received for both the Mother and Baby Unit and Christmas items for the Freedom Centre. After lunch we had an interesting talk about the Bideford Community Archive by its chairman Kate Harrison and which was established in 1983. There is a team of 20 volunteers who collect and preserve documents, maps, books and photos etc. covering the area from Instow to Kilkhampton, and many of the stories, some of which were mentioned, come from the Bideford and North Devon Gazette.

The Archive is in the offices of Northam Town Council and open on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings.









One final point – due to the meetings often running until after 10'clock, we have decided that in the future we'll start at 12.15 so that we don't keep the hotel staff waiting to serve the lunch.
