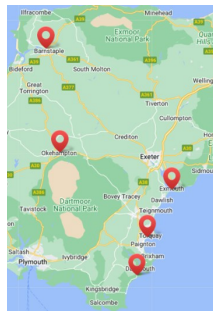




COAST TO COAST REVISITED INNER WHEEL DISTRICT 17

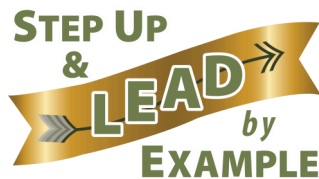

November highlighted a busy and charitable month. A quiz night hosted by our Secretary Jane Lowe raised funds for North Devon Hospice, alongside a coffee morning organised by Liz Harris.

We welcomed a visit from District Chairman Deirdre in February and were pleased to host Torquay Club at our March meeting with a speaker from Rowcroft House.

The morning was taken up with Inner Wheel business, and all proposals were voted on by mobile phones which was quick and easy. The Conference was well organised providing entertaining speakers, and a lovely walk around Llandudno, certainly kept us all busy. Pat

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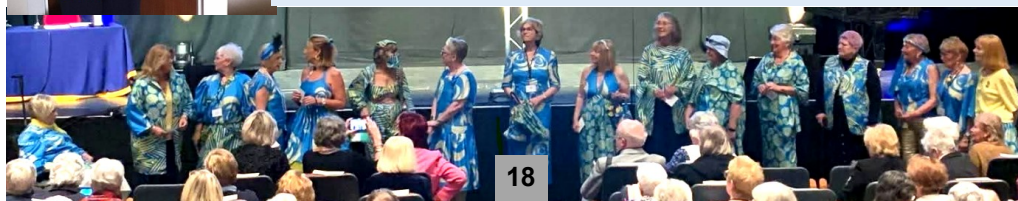

The scarf to garment competition was fun and Patrick Grant's talk and judging was well done. It was fun to be able to participate in that. Deirdre

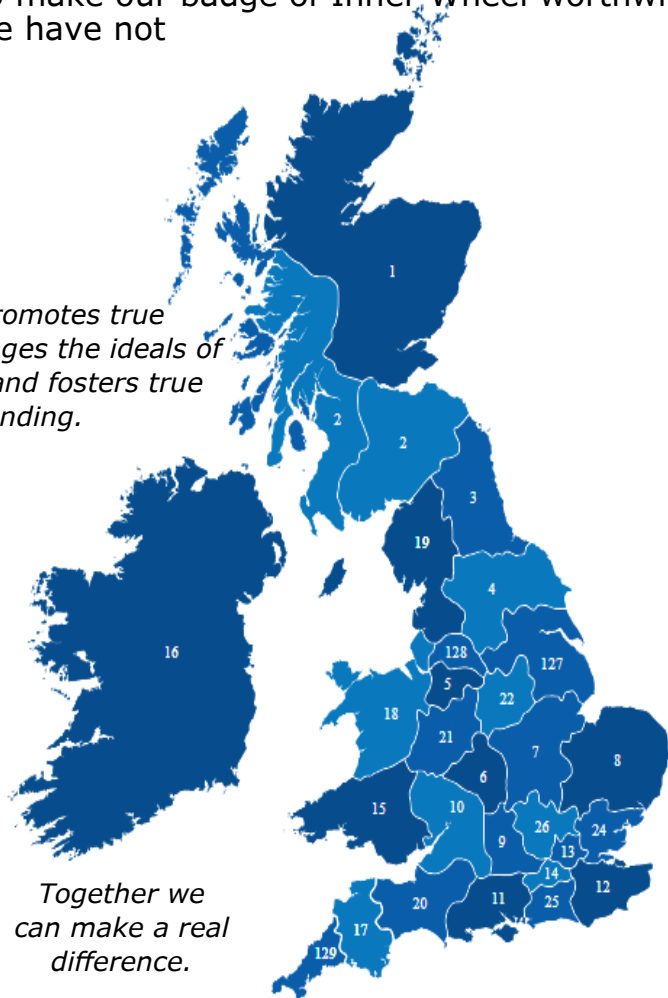
